She also loved working in her flowers, caring for them as if they were her own, and spent many peaceful hours raking leaves so they would never cover them. In her free time, she enjoyed walking from her house to Steve's and Michele's—getting outside, visiting, and making sure she knew what was planned for dinner. She also greatly enjoyed working jigsaw puzzles and completing crossword puzzles, finding both joy and comfort in the quiet moments they provided—simple pleasures that reflected her thoughtful and steady nature.

She was preceded in death by her husband Dean Harmon, her parents Orville and Lona Robertson, and other loved ones who welcomed her home.
