



Dr. Patrick LeGrand Parker

March 13, 1933 - April 6, 2011

Dr. Patrick LeGrand Parker, 78, of Bald Knob, died Wednesday, April 6, 2011 at the Advanced Care Hospital in Searcy. He was born March 13, 1933 in El Dorado, Arkansas a son of the late Chester and Emily Plunkett Parker. Dr. Parker was a retired research chemist at the University of Texas Marine Science Institute in Port Aransas, Texas and had served as director of the program for some years. The majority of his career, 1959 – mid 1990's, was spent at the institute. He, at various times from 1965 – 1977, served as Trustee of the Port Aransas Independent School District and was also co-owner of Coastal Science Labs in Austin, Texas. In 1996, the Geochemical Society of America presented Dr. Parker the Alfred Treibs Award which is given for major achievement in Organic Geochemistry. During his retirement, he; with his own hands, restored a family country farm house, more than 100 years old, outside Bald Knob. The Arkansas Historic Preservation Program certified the house was placed on the National Registry of Historic Places in 1992.

He is survived by his wife, Avalyn Moseley Parker of Bald Knob; sons, Dan Parker of Port Aransas, Texas, Ron Parker of Manchaca, Texas and Kevin Parker of Austin, Texas; brother, Max Parker of Little Rock; grandson, Zach Parker of Port Aransas, Texas; daughter-in-law, Michelle Christenson of Port Aransas, Texas; and sister-in-law, Judith Moseley of Bald Knob.

Services will be private.
